- On January 17, 2024, Washington
 Utilities and Transportation
 Commission approved Pacific Power's
 2024-2025 Biennial Conservation Plan
- The Plan was approved with conditions and can be found here: <u>Docket UE-</u> <u>230904</u>
- The Biennial Conservation Plan outlines actions the utility is putting into place to achieve its total conservation (energy efficiency) goals

Transportation Electrification



WA Communities Grant Program: Key Objectives

Reduce costs of ownership by covering up to 100% of the eligible costs of studying, planning, promoting or deploying electric transportation technology and projects

Encourage traditional industries to adopt and shift towards transportation electrification

Raise awareness and education around transportation electrification for customers by highlighting what transportation electrification can do

Remove barriers to applying for grant funding

Provide a simple, flexible and equitable grant funding mechanism

Our activity goal is to provide feedback to help refine scoring criteria leading up to program launch

Weatherization



Weatherization Basics





Mechanical Measures

- Clean, tune, repair or replace heating and/or cooling systems
- Install duct and heating pipe insulation
- Repair leaks in heating/cooling ducts
- Install programmable thermostats
- Repair/replace water heaters
- Install water heater tank insulation
- Insulate water heating pipes
- Install solar hot water heating systems.



Building Shell Measures

- Install insulation where needed
- Perform air sealing
- Repair/replace windows and doors
- Install window film, awnings and solar screens
- Repair minor roof and wall leaks prior to attic or wall insulation.



Electric Baseload Measures


- Install efficient light sources
- Install low-flow showerheads
- Replace inefficient refrigerators with energy-efficient models.



Health & Safety Measures

- · Perform heating system safety testing
- Perform combustion appliance safety testing
- Repair/replace vent systems to ensure combustion gas drafts safely outside
- Install mechanical ventilation to ensure adequate indoor air quality
- Install smoke and carbon monoxide alarms when needed
- Evaluate mold/moisture hazards
- Perform incidental safety repairs when needed.

Leveraging Funding – Financial assistance leverages agency funds and moves to 100% when agency funds are expended

Funding Cap – There is no cap on how much Pacific Power can support project partners

The primary focus is the customer


- Maximum transparency
- Agnostic to technology
- Cost driver
- Reliability driver
- The first pass, is the least cost, least risk limited by system constraints
- The second pass, is the least cost, least risk limited by state constraints
 - No cost shifting for state compliance



- Specific timing for milestones in six states
- Stakeholder feedback is critical to improving the quality of the work product
- Milestones will be delivered based on the most restrictive state timing
- Meetings are scheduled at Lloyd Center Tower but locations may be revised as technology becomes available at other locations

PacifiCorp serves nearly 2 million customers across six states


- Pacific Power serves Oregon, Washington and California customers

Regulatory Cycle


PacifiCorp has been producing resource plans for over two decades (what, when, where, and how much)

PacifiCorp operates its two balancing authority areas as a single system—planning aligns with this paradigm (one plan for all states)

PacifiCorp has a two-year IRP cycle with updates in off years to highlight how changes in the planning environment affect the plan (limited scope)

We include:

- Costs and risks from our customers' perspective (six states with retail load)
- A 20-year planning horizon
- Extensive stakeholder input and outreach
- Intensive data modeling and portfolio analysis
